

Dear friends,

Since I sent you the second issue of SAKURA, I have been busy settling down in my new environment-- means the new place we moved into and also the new position I took at Nihon University. ### New Place

I am in the fifth year of working for this university. My research is going very well and I am busy making presentations in conferences and writing articles for journals at home and abroad.
